We praise God and thank Him for all you out there who poured so much of your love in your generosity!



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

These leaders hear all different kinds of excuses from these members. Are you guilty? Below are some excuses—and some answers for them.

I have an headache on Sunday morning.


Stop drinking Saturday night!

The advertising part of the telephone book, the Yellow Pages, for years had a slogan that said, "Let Your Fingers Do the Walking."

"Walking" sounds like "Talking", and there are those of us, deaf and hearing, who have let our fingers do the talking over a period of many years. The happenings of these years have given many rich, great memories. Every year the pleasure of remembering seems to be more and more pleasurable.

Remembering is clearly a part of Biblical teaching. Ecclesiastes 12:1 teaches the young to remember their Creator in the days of their youth. Not remembering is dangerous: Jeremiah 2:32, "...My people have forgotten Me days without number." Luke 16:25 tells that the rich man remembered that wiser choices would have made him happier, and Acts 9:39 relates the people remembering the kind acts of Dorcas.

Letting our fingers do the walking down Memory Lane for a few minutes, remember with me some of the moments we have shared, and what has dome from these times in our efforts together to share the wonderful Word of God with the deaf. How many working with the deaf in the church today came through some of Bill Leavell's Sign Language classes at Lipscomb? Do you remember his sign for "Lipscomb", and "Understand"?

Camp Wyldewood was the site for the making of many lasting impressions. Were you there to see the fireball go through the darkened sky, hitting and putting ablaze a cross? "Nursie's" caring was so warm. Loyd Williams came to the rescue when the youngest camper, Patty Hocker's legs got too tired on the hikes: Loyd just lifted her up to his shoulders and gave her a ride. The Maynards and Andersons were the sparkplugs that kept those camping sessions hopping. The Leavells tested out Harding's swings, and the tradition of the swings has worked well with them. Does anyone know where the young girl is who was there at camp, having become deaf when a train explosion happened near her home? Somewhere it was learned that she may have had surgery restoring her hearing, and was going into nursing. Who has more information? The Sam Roach family was as much a part of Camp Wyldewood as was Inspiration Point. Gladys Holland and her son, Benny, have been so important in this great work and are esteemed so highly.

Which of you were in Detroit for the Jimmy Allen Campaign at Cobo Hall? Our young signers made fine ushers for the deaf in that meeting. Several nights there were so many being baptized that we would pul the wet socks off of someone just baptized to put on another person in the line so they would not slip and fall on the wet floor. Do you remember the daughter of the deaf couple who requested to be baptized in the tank nearer where we were sitting so her parents could see her better? The deaf group in the church in Detroit at that time was the largest group of deaf persons meeting in the state.

Brother Marshall Keeble dearly loved the deaf. The young boys with him had learned at least the alphabet, and worked hard to be especialy friendly with those of us in the deaf group. Interpreting for Brother Keeble was a special challenge. How do you sign "Auugh-ugh", the throaty sound he would make when he made a special point in his speaking? He would always take time to visit with us, and his friendliness and warmth came through loud and clear.

Brother Woods really enjoyed being with brother Eldon Birdwell there at Eastside Central congregation in Detroit. The two men shared a comradarie that did not need an interpreter.

The workshops are a whole chapter of fond remembrances! None could be more memoriable than the year the EVD was first presented. We saw the "pioneers" in the work with the deaf there on the stage; Dr. Jon Ashby said that if he were deaf, he would wish to have lived either during the time our Lord gave hearing to the deaf, or that night, when for the first time, the deaf had the New Testament in their own language. The smell of the ink and bindings of the EVDs being taken out of the crates in the back rooms came across the people there like a cloud. Was there anyone whose eyes did not have tears of appreciation and thrill?

In Maryland, the local preacher was trying to locate the deaf of the area before their meeting, since the preacher's wife would interpret for the deaf. deaf before the meeting, but a visit to the local Social Services office, and then the newspaper started the contacts with each deaf person giving the names and addresses of deaf known to them, and the congregation there had a good deaf work started by the end of the meeting. One deaf couple lived just down the street from the local preacher, and there were tears of joy as the deaf woman told of how thrilled they were now to have a place where they could learn more about God. When a family had the visiting preacher and his wife over to their home for a meal, they were often shocked when a large number of other people would come too, wanting to learn a few more signs in every minute of that meeting. There was even signing and checking signs through the window of the plane as the meeting preacher went back home.

A group of the deaf from the Canton, Ohio congregation appeared at our door in Detroit New Year's Eve, about 1:00 a.m. They were far away from home, but wanted to be certain they had found the church before time for the worship service the next morning.

The thrill of meeting deaf persons who live far away from other deaf has been great. The eyes become so wide, and then the questions begin to fly as friendships happen in a minute. A meeting in Mississipppi let us meet a fine Christian man who lives a long distance from the nearest deaf person. The week of the meeting was as important to us as it was to him. We live far apart but he writes the richest leters to us. In New Mexico, the lady was the only deaf person in that town, and we both enjoyed talking together. Soon some of the children on the church bus route learned enough signs to be able to talk with this lady as they met in the grocery store and other places in town. An Ohio man became ill at a meeting in a distant city. The sign on his hospital bed said "Deaf" but the nurse stood behind him and yelled, "ARE YOU FEELING ANY BETTER YET?" The nurse had a funny look when fingers flew for a minute, and then the voice of the man's new friend told the nurse, "He may be feeling a little btter but he really would appreciate it if he could at least hold some crushed ice in his mouth.

At a Christian home and school, there is a dear deaf lady who is the only deaf person working and living there. She and the children

here are an example of how much communication can go on even when they do not use the same language: she loves them, and they love her. The deaf who are isolated from other deaf must be very lonesome for friends they can easily communicate with, and the LIGHT FOR THE DEAF and other publications meet a special need here.

Being in the hospital in a strange town was not comfortable. The hallway was full of people. Above the heads of all the rest was a hand saying "Hi!" The Bob Andersons were ready to do everything they could to help, and their being there did help, a lot!

Sunday a deaf couple from another state visited with us for the worship services. The man was known from earlier workshops, and the woman was a delight to meet. They were very knowledgeable about the Bible, and obviously very active in the church.

Even before a public figure used the phrase, I had a dream: it was the dream that a deaf person in any part of the country could attend services in any congregation, and there would be an interpreter so all could "hear". The woman at the services Sunday told of coming to this area years ago, and sitting in a congregation where there was no interpreter. She said she did this because she was "not to forsake the assemblying...", and so she went to the services regardless! Sad, that there was no interpreter, but how great that she had such an understanding of what she was to do!

There has been much progress. Young people will find it hard to believe that there was a time when the deaf group had to meet in the back of the auditorium for the worship service. There was the thought that signing would be distracting to the hearing. It took time, but now the understanding is that the hearing can more easily train themselves not to be distracted, that signing is more like "instant replay" on television than it is a distraction, and the deaf sits up front, where the speaker's expressions and mouth can be more easily seen. Interpreters in some places are even paid. Imagine that! In some places, it is understood that their time, effort and even gasoline are as worthy of compensation as the preacher's. (I recall flying to the other end of a certain state to interpret a meeting, and there was not even a "Thank you." My ticket had cost me a ot of money.) Deaf take an active part in the worship service, waiting on the Lord's Table, serving in many ways. The EVD, now in the Old and New Testaments will permit the deaf to better "study to show themselves approved unto God..." and let them become even strong Christians, more knowledgeable of God's Word.

These remembrances are just a few of many dear, valued and important happenings over a twenty-five year period. These are happenings and people who have enriched my life, and hurdles that have been overcome in a work that is very dear to me and my family. I wonder what wonderful things will have happened by the time, perhaps in another twenty-five years, that we again take a walk down memory lane, where we have "let our fingers do the talking!"

Our Position on HOMOSEXUALITY

Recently it came to our attention that in an article this editor wrote in the January/February/March 1985 issue, it appeared that he was saying that a homosexual could be baptized without his first stopping his sin.

We took out our copy of this issue and examined the afore mentioned article closely. After making our examination, we are satisfied that our language never once showed that homosexuality is a sin that we can tolerate in the church. Our article did encourage the homosexual wanting to break his sin to seek counseling from a qualified Christian. Since we did not mention the homosexual having to stop his sin before baptism, it is easy for some readers to misunderstand us this way.

So on these pages we are attempting to make our position clearer than in the January/February/March 1985 issue. We would appreciate any response or comment from any reader who thinks we are in error.

1. Should a homosexual stop his sin before he is baptized?

Yes! Peter in his sermon to the Jews on Pentecost Day, told them that they must repent and be baptized before they could be forgiven. (Acts 2:38) The word "repent" is the King James Version's translation of a Greek word meaning to think differently (Strong's Concordance). This is why the English Version for the Deaf, in trying to make the Greek clear to deaf readers, translated "change your minds and hearts".

The idea behind the word "repent" is that the sinner changes his attitude toward his sin, whatever it is (as well as to sin in general). The sinner must realize that his sin separates him from his God. (Isaiah 59:2) Homosexuality is clearly taught to be a sin in God's Holy Bible. (See Leviticus 18:22, 20:13; Romans 1:24, 26-27; 1 Corinthians 6:9-10) So if a person is a homosexual when he hears and believes the gospel, he must realize he is to stop his sin before he can obey the Lord Jesus Christ in baptism.

2. Is it possible for a person to be baptized when the church does not realize he is a homosexual?

Sadly, yes, because the church cannot read his heart and because they cannot see every act the person does. This is true of any sinner. A lady might be a prostitute or a man might be an alcoholic without our knowledge, etc. But if we know that they are guilty of these sins, then we should strongly advise them to stop these sins before we will accept the task of baptizing them.

3. Should a Christian visit a homosexual to teach him the gospel?

Certainly! Our Lord sent us into all the world to all people. He wants us to teach the gospel to homosexuals as well as to other kinds of sinners. Romans 10:14 clearly teaches that sinners cannot believe if someone does not teach them God's Word first.

4. Can a homosexual be completely cured?

Forgiven of his sins, yes, but in some cases he cannot be fully cured of his lust for homosexuality. By this we mean that since he has habitually exercised his sin, the feeling of pleasure that he received will be hard to erase. It is the same with alcoholics and drug addicts. They can be forgiven of their sins, but their desire for alcohol and/or drugs cannot disappear in one day. It is possible that some of them can overcome their lust so that they never again desire further homosexual experience. This can be done by Christ's help! (Philippians 4:13) But we believe that for many of them, we should be patient and help them overcome this desire.

5. Are homosexuals responsible for the AIDS epidemic?

Partly! Experts believe the AIDS virus was first spread in Africa by heterosexuals (people who use normal sex). Some people who contracted the AIDS virus were bisexuals (people who accept sex with a person of their own sex, or of the opposite sex). This is how homosexuals spread this disease to the United States. This fits what Romans 1:27 talks about when it says homosexuals received "recompense" (King James Version) or "penalty" (Revised Standard Version) or "punishment" (English Version for the Deaf) for their sin. This does not mean the AIDS disease alone, but any sexual disease. However heterosexuals will have to share responsibility for spreading the AIDS disease in the United States.

6. Will a homosexual's sins be really forgiven him if he is baptized?

Only if he truly believes in the Lord Jesus and changes his attitude toward his sin! (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38) Baptism has no power in itself, but it is our faith and obedience that cleanses our hearts. (See 1 Peter 3:21; Acts 15:9; 1 John 1:7)

"This is just a note to say we are thinking of you. Also, we want to thank you for the special work you do in the Lord's kingdom."


