This issue we look at **Baptism.** Too many religious teachers have neglected this subject. In fact they often ignore it when they invite people to accept Christ as their Savior. It is dangerous to ignore the teaching on baptism when you invite


people to accept Christ (Revelation 22:19)!

But at the same time it is also dangerous to put too much emphasis on baptism, because baptism itself is not what saves you. As you will see on page 12, the apostle Peter explains that baptism is not a "bath to remove bodily filth" (1 Peter 3:21). The English Version for the Deaf (EVD) translates this, "not the washing of dirt from the body." Peter continues on to say, "It (baptism) is the answer of a good conscience toward God." The Greek word translated "answer" means "plea" or "appeal". The meaning is asking God for a cleansed conscience. The EVD hits it on the nail when it translates, "Baptism is asking God for a pure heart."

The idea is that when you are baptized, you do so because you believe in Christ and have reached out your arms to Him to cleanse you of your sins. Ananias told Saul not to delay, but to get up and be baptized, calling on the name of the

Lord." (Acts 22:16)





AND WHEN JESUS WAS BAPTIZED, HE CAME UP OUT OF THE WATER.






THAT SHOWS JESUS WAS IN THE WATER WHEN HE WAS BAPTIZED.

In our last issue we mentioned that one of our readers, Jimmy Bailey, requested we ask our readers what they think of the amount of pages we give over to comic strips in LIGHT FOR THE DEAF. Jimmy himself didn't like these comic strips. He preferred we use only a few pages like we did in the early days of LIGHT FOR THE DEAF. (We used only two or three pages at that time.) He preferred that we use most of our pages for text articles. Below is our feedback from our readers.

Please continue comic strips because lots of deaf people can't write or read. They love your Christian comic strips and they will be disappointment if you cut down your use of comic strips. They understood the pictures— want more comic strips and less text, or 50% of comic strips, 50% of text— fair 100%.

I'm your reader. You asked how big or little their comic strips are. I would say of between big and little. At least, seven pages, plus texts. Known as halves. This may please you and your work for the Lord as far as this toward average deaf Christians.

Thank you, Bob. But we have 20 pages per issue, so 7 pages isn't we mone-half" our page count. But we understand what you mean. In fact some of our comic strips are only seven pages or even less. Sometimes we need more than seven page to

cover a subject satisfactorily, as you can see in this issue's 13-page coverage of baptism.

I am concerned that Jimmy Bailey probably doesn't realize some deaf have poor education so they cannot read and easily misunderstand. Remember I myself wrote you about two years ago asking you to publish "One Church". I would prefer you to continue using comic strips and text and let the deaf choose what they can understand than to throw away an all-text issue because they can't understand the text very well in the English language.

So I urge you to keep on your present method of using comic strips.


There are so many people out in this world who are screaming, "Please listen to me!" Even in the silent world of the deaf the problem is compounded.
