A look at the planets shows the different lengths of days and years they have. Below we look at some of these planets:

Mercury. Its day is 59 Earth days. So it has only 3 "days" in 2 of its "years" (orbits around the sun)!

Venus. Its day is 243 Earth days. And a year for Venus takes 224.7 Earth days. So you see a Venusian day is longer than a Venusian year!

Mars. This planet is the most like Earth in its days. A day on Mars is 24 hours, 37 minutes. But it takes Mars 687 Earth days to complete its year (orbit around the sun).

Pluto. This is the farthest known planet at the edge of the solar system. It takes 248 Earth years to complete its year (orbit around the sun). So none of us here on earth ever live long enough to see Pluto complete a year.

The above facts are fascinating. But when we look at God, we are even more impressed! From Isaiah 57:15 and Micah 5:2 we learn that God inhabits [lives in] eternity! Jeremiah

10:10 also teaches us that God rules eternity (King James Version). The Psalmist said:

"Before there were mountains, or land, or the world, You were God.

God, You were always God, and You will always be God!"

Psalm 90:2 (EVD)

Both the Old Testament and the New Testament teach that God lives forever. (For examples see Genesis 21:33 and Romans 16:26.)

Elihu was right when he told Job, "No person can count the numbers of God's years" (Job 36:26, EVD). And the prophet Isaiah said this about God:

"Surely you have heard and that the Lord God is very wise,

and people can't learn all the things He knows.

The Lord does not become tired and need to rest.

The Lord made all the faraway places on earth.

The Lord lives forever."

Isaiah 40:28 (EVD)

And Isaiah also says God is:
"The One who is high and lifted up,

the One who lives forever, the One whose name is holy."

Isaiah 57:15 (EVD)

How did God begin to be?
He had no beginning. He always
was! He says, "I am the only
God. There are no other gods.

End" (Isaiah 44:6, EVD).

The True Meaning of the Word "Christian"

"Christian" was the name given by the Greeks or Romans, probably in reproach, at Antioch in Asia Minor. The names by which the disciples were known among themselves were "brethren", "the faithful", "elect", "saints" and "believers". But as distinguishing them from the multitude outside (unbelievers), the name "Christian" came into use, and was universally accepted. This name occurs but three times in the New Testament:

"And the disciples were called Christians first at Antioch" (Acts 11:26). Whether they were called such by people or God we do not know.

"Then Agrippa said unto Paul, 'Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian" (Acts 26:28).

"Yet if any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed, but let him glorify God on this behalf" (1 Peter 4:16).

You will note in each case, it is always a noun, not an adjective. Although the early disciples

may have been maliciously nicknamed "Christians" by their enemies, we today have adopted that worthy name.

A Christian is a person who follows Christ in His teachings. Christ teaches each person to believe Him, to repent of his sins, to confess Christ as the Son of the living God, and to be buried with Christ in His death by being baptized with water for the remission of his sins; and then he is saved a Christian and at the same time a member of His church which is His body. The Lord adds him to the church after baptism only validated by his preceding stepsbelieve, repent, and confess Christ.

We today use the name "Christian" as an adjective to describe anything or any person that is Christlike or pertains to His teachings. For example: Christian home, Christian family, Christian school or college, Christian workers, Christian ideals, Christian love, etc.

In Light for the Deaf #121 we ran an article by Gary Chadwick regarding the New Birth. Tony Demonbreun, hearing preacher for the Church of Christ in Selma, Alabama, wrote us expressing his concern with the article and showing Scripture which refutes Gary's conclusions. We sent a photocopy of Demonbreun's letter to Gary. We asked him (Gary) to grant us permission to print an edited version of his reply to Demonbreun here. (We removed certain personal remarks and cut the letter to fit our space.)

your After reading letter. my initial reaction was to defend my views with the support of the biblical data as evidence. but later on, after further examination of 1 Peter, I began to realize the error of my interpretation. I want to thank you for having brought to my attention the things in my article that may contradict the teachings of the Bible. It is my earnest desire and intention to strive for a better understanding of what the Bible teaches on any given subject.

I know in my heart that you are doing your best to help me "understand the way of God better" (Acts 18:25,26) in a spirit of love and gentleness.

Any interpretation that contradicts itself must be logically considered a false interpretation by other Scriptural passages. An interpreter must draw his conclusions as warranted by the biblical data as evidence. This means that I was not a careful student of God's Word and that I misinterpreted the contextual meaning of 1 Peter 1:23. This passage contradicts my views that a child of God

living today is "not eligible to be called a born again Christian". Therefore my interpretation is a false interpretation rather than an "interesting interpretation" in Bro. Leavell's editorial comments on the inside cover of Light for the Deaf #121.

When I read your statement "First Peter was written Jews and Gentiles", I checked several Bible commentaries on 1 Peter and and two books on NT introductions that sat on my new book shelf in the family den room, and all writers were unanimous that 1 Peter was never addressed to only Jewish believers as I once thought. What led me to Peter's audience misidentify was the word "scattered". "scattered" is a Jewish denoting Jews who live outside the land of Palestine but who continued to follow the rules and customs of Jewish religion. However I did not know that this term can be Gentile believers applied to when they were forced to flee from Nero's persecution in Rome and to live in foreign lands "all around the areas of Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and

Bithynia" (1 Peter 1:1).

As I Peter 1:23 says in the New King James Version, taken from your letter, "Having been again, not of corruptible seed but incorruptible, through word of God which lives abides forever". Here is an interesting contrast between two different kinds of seeds-"corruptible" and "incorruptible". Two Greek transliteration terms are "phthartos" meaning "decayed, i.e. (by impl.) perishable, "aphthartos" corruptible", and meaning "undecaying (in essence of continuance): immortal, incorruptible" (Abingdon's Strong's Exhaustive Concordance of the "a" The Greek letter Bible). is a prefix term meaning "not", "without", or "lacking". So let us read the English Version for the Deaf for a better rendering of these Greek terms into plain "You have been born English. This new life did not again. come from something that dies. That life came from something You were that cannot die. born again through God's living message that continues forever."

It has been made clear to me that Peter did not have in mind two covenant births that I had once thought. Instead, he had in mind two different "corruptible" births-kinds of and "incorruptible". The "corruptible" seed brings forth natural birth while the "incorruptible" seed brings forth spiritual birth. The seed that brings forth natural birth is styled "corruptible" because the physical body is born to die on earth. The seed that birth is brings forth spiritual "incorruptible" styled because the spiritual body is born to live forever in heaven. "The Paul says, apostle that is 'planted' will ruin and decay. But that body is raised to a life that cannot be destroyed... The body that is 'planted' is a physical body. When It is raised, it is a spiritual body" (1 Corinthians 15:42,44).

A correct understanding 1 Peter 1:23 is that Peter is trying to tell his readers the permanent nature of the life given through the They must learn to of God. "love each other deeply" (v. Why? Because they have been born again, and that is the only way to enter the fellowship of God's people that will last forever (v. 23). So it is very important that thev not to be self-centered, rather Christ-centered in with anotherfellowship one the kind of fellowship that will deepen and remain for eternity.

I am guilty of using eisegesis (reading an interpretation into the text) but in an intentional way. I will try my best to use exegesis (reading an interpretation out of the text) from now on. My apology goes out to you and to all readers of Light for the Deaf for my mistaken interpretation of the New Birth.

We thank Gary Chadwick for his honest admission of error in his article. In case you missed the point of Gary's letter, Gary now believes the New Birth is valid today and that we most certainly can be born again by God's Word. There are many sincere Bible students like Gary who may occasionally err by a mistaken view of the Scriptures' teaching. There is nothing shameful in publicly admitting error when you find it is error, as long as you renounce that error and move on to a more correct understanding of the Scripture. Gary has done this. Now, move on to the next page for an error the Editor made.

"In the Lord..."

The below letter and article were given to me by Frank Rushing when he recently visited my office. We appreciate his material. Please see my comments at the end of the article.

I really appreciate very much your work preparing the Light for the Deaf. The scripture teachings in this magazine have been loaded with truth. there is misunderstanding the meanings of the scriptures, it usually would be corrected. I know you want truth to be poclaimed to your readers. Some articles may be profitable for our discussions, thus we can increase the horizons of our knowledge of the scriptures.

However, I would like to give you my viewpoint on the subject "only in the Lord" compared to your replies in your "Questions and Answers" section. I am expecting some criticisms from some of your readers, but let us study this passage of 1 Corinthians 7:39. My write-up has resulted from my study of this passage for some years.

"Only in the Lord"

What the apostle Paul states in 1 Corinthians 7:39 (EVD) is so vital that we should read study and understand its meaning.

I have read some articles

I have read some articles in some magazines and books on this subject, and there are

some differences concerning "only in the Lord" in this passage. Now let us quote what Paul "A woman must stay states: with her husband as long as But if the husband he lives. dies the woman is free to marry any man she wants. But she must marry in the Lord." Does this passage give specific direction that this phrase "only in the Lord" means that the woman who lost her husband by death, but wishes to marry again, should marry a man who is a Christian? New Testament nowhere commands a Christian man or woman as to whom they should There is one and only one direction restricting marriage of a widow, and that is found same passage What about those maidens that are not under that same restriction?

As I study this passage, I believe that the context of this passage not to mean the persons to be married, but to mean Let us study marrying itself. "Wives, another passage: under the authority of (obey) your husbands. This is the right thing to do in the Lord (Colos-"In the Lord" sians 3:18, EVD). in this passage does not mean that the husbands are themselves

in the Lord, but it means the conduct of the wives. This conduct is what is unto the Lord and it is designed to elevate the character of the wife, therefore to make her a fit companion of her husband.

Another passage says, "Wives, be under the authority of (obey) your husbands the same as the Lord" (Ephesians 5:22, EVD). This helps us understand Colossians 3:18 when it says in the Lord".

My understanding is that the widow could select a man, either a Christian or non-Christian, as her husband. That would be pleasing to the Lord as long as she does not violate the teaching of Christ on marriage. For example, it would not please the Lord if the widow married an unscripturally divorced person.

We must bear in mind that Corinthians 7:39 does specify whether this widow is a Christian or not. So this passage puts us under no authorization to guess or decide on which. But I believe that Paul was talking about either one. If Paul means a Christian, then she must please the Lord by marrying a Christian man she could elevate the marriage to a level which God will bless. On the other side, if the Christian widow chooses to marry a non-Christian or a man of a different faith, it may not be pleasing to the Lord. Paul stated, "You are not the same as those people So don't who don't believe. ioin yourselves to them. Good and bad don't belong together. Light and darkness cannot have fellowship (sharing). How can Christ and Beliah (the devil) have any agreement? What can a believer have together with a non-believer? (2 Corinthians 6:14,15). So the widow marrying a non-Christian would not be doing it for the Lord's sake.

What if in this case a non-Christian widow wants to marry a Christian man "only in the Lord"? Would that Christian be the victim of 2 Corinthians 6:14,15? The usual interpretation of this passage may not be the right answer and may not be so pleasing to the Lord!

In conclusion I believe the Lord wants every widow to have a good marriage when she remarries. A Christian widow should have a proper sense of her obligations to Christ. She should not marry a non-Christian man because she may not have deep convictions of the importance and truth of her faith as she non-Christian should have. A husband may degrade her usefulness for the Lord as he may have no respect for her faith and may interfere with her service for the Lord as she wishes. He may encourage or push her to join in his society where God may be excluded.

It is the duty of every widow to devote her life to Christ and to follow all the teachings of the Lord. She should marry the man approved of our Lord. But we should understand the definition of "only in the Lord" to be "a woman should be bound to her husband as long as he is alive, but if he dies, he is free to marry any man she wants, but let her be guided by the Lord."

I believe Frank is correct in that "in the Lord" does not refer to marrying only a Christian, but to the marrying itself; that is, the marrying must agree with God's will. The Scripture itself does not say that we must marry a Christian, but we all agree that it would be wise. Thank you, Frank, for correcting us!

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
