




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
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


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# LIFE IS TOO SHORT

Basically there are two things that prevent people from applying God's Word in their lives.

First is sin. Sin disorients us to God and causes us to stop seeking Him (read Romans 3:11). Sin makes us self-centered instead of God-centered. Sin causes our prayers to go unheard and quenches the Spirit's working within us.


**Second**, worldly things dull our senses to receiving a word from God. For example, an average family spends over seven hours with their television each day! When you watch television you do so to gain information or for entertainment. Too often our thinking becomes blurred. One moment we are

watching a dramatic reenactment of a battle scene depicting suffering and death, and then with a push of a button we can see a war-torn country where real people are suffering and dying. Our hearts have already been numbed to death and dying. So, we walk away from our television unmoved and unchanged.

We can approach God's word in the same way. God's word is never for our entertainment, information, or observation, but obedience. God's word never allows us to remain the same. Today many Christians are uncertain when God is speaking to them.

All of our understanding must be taken from Scripture. Too many people base their faith on human reasoning. It is easy to assume that God relates to you in the same way that people relate to each other. This is untrue. You may need to make adjustments in your life to experience fully God speaking to you. Whenever my experience does not match what I find revealed in Scripture, I immediately seek to bring my experience into conformity with Scripture and not the other way around.

God speaks through the Bible. Genesis 1 repeatedly states, "God spoke... it was so... it was good." What God says always comes to pass and it is always good. Read Isaiah 14:24,27.

### **ROMANS 12:1-2**

I urge you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship. And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect. NASB

We have read this verse a great number of times. These verses are well known in teaching your body as a living sacrifice. But I really want to focus on the worship part: "Spiritual service or worship."

Before we can worship God, we must love Him with all our heart, soul, mind and strength (Mark 12:30). It is easier to sacrifce your life for someone you love very much. ### Question

When Jesus comes again, will our physical body rise out of the ground if we are already dead?

1 Corinthians 15:35 says, "But someone will say, "How are the dead raised up? And with what body do they come?" Paul answers this question by explaining that a plant cannot grow until first you sow a humble seed (see 1 Corinthians 15:36-41). This seed must "die" in order for the new plant to grow. The plant has a different "body" from the seed from which it grew. Paul says, "So also is the resurrection of the dead. The body is sown in corruption, it is raised in incorruption. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body. There is a natural body, and there is a spiritual body" (1 Corinthians 15:42-44).

The body that the resurrected Christian will have is different from what he has here on earth. What will it look like? John answers: "Beloved, now we are children of God; and it has **not yet been revealed** what we shall be, but we know that when He is revealed, we shall **be like Him**, for we shall see Him as He is" (1 John 3:2).

Paul explains that "We shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed" (1 Corinthians 15:51). We will have new spiritual bodies. We will be like Jesus in His glory.

Finally, you ask if our physical body will rise out of the ground if we are already dead. Over and over the Scriptures teach the resurrection of the dead. Will they rise out of the ground? Maybe. Will those who were burned or cremated suddenly come together again into a body? Maybe. Will those who were blasted into smithreens suddenly come back into a body again? Maybe. We do not know. No matter, the dead will be raised to life again. Thus we look forward to Christ's Second Coming!

### Question

I didn't know that God gets jealous. But what is He jealous about?

### Answer

Let's look at the second of the Ten Commandments in Exocus 20: "You shall not make for yourself a carved image, or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth; you shall not bow down to them nor serve them. For I, the LORD your God, am a **jealous God**, visiting the iniquity of the fathers on the children to the third and fourth generations of those who hate Me" (verses 4-5).

And there is this passage: "They have provoked Me to jealousy by what is not God; They have moved Me to anger by their foolish idols" (Deuteronomy 32:21).

Many times we think of jealousy as being a bad thing. It is true it can be a bad thing, but there is also good jealousy. Paul even talks about "godly jealousy": "For I am jealous for you with godly jealousy. For I have betrothed you to one husband, that I may present you as a chaste virgin to Christ" (2 Corinthians 11:2). "Betrothed" means to engage. Paul converted many of the Corinthians to Christ, so in this way he "engaged" them to one husband (Christ). The church is often pictured as Christ's bride. In Bible times a bride on her wedding day would wait for the groom to come for her and to take her home with him. This is different from our wedding customs today. In the same way, the church, engaged to Christ, will have its "wedding day" when Christ comes again to this world to take it home. So Paul was jealous of anything that would lead the church in Corinth away from God, which is why he called his "jealousy" a "godly jealousy".

God is jealous when we stray from Him to the world or to another "god". In the same way a husband is jealous when his wife goes to another man. This jealousy is good, but the kind of jealousy in which a person is upset that another person is better than him (or her) is wrong.

# Reverend V. Gene Robinson and the **Episcopal Church**

On August 5, 2003, the Episcopal Church voted on Rev. V.

Gene Robinson as its first openly gay bishop.

This sent shock waves through the denomination. Conservative members were upset. They boycotted the meetings. Other Anglican churches, especially in Africa, denounced this act. Kenyan Bishop Joseph Kanuku said, "It's wrong and it's against the Bible. How can we go against God's words? Two men being joined is contrary to nature and contrary to the Bible." The Kenyan Anglicans are planning to disfellowship the Episcopal Church in the U.S.A.

We have to agree with Bishop Kanuku. He hit it on the nail. Not only is gay partnership against nature, it is also against the

The following passages from the Bible are very plain:

The wrong things our sinful self does are clear: being sexually unfaithful, not being pure, doing sexual sins... warn you now like I warned you before: The people who do these things will not be in God's kingdom.

Galatians 5:19,21, EVD

You can be sure of this: No person will have a place in the kingdom of Christ and of God if that person does sexual sins...

Ephesians 5:5, EVD

Surely you know that the people that do wrong will not get God's kingdom. Don't be fooled. These people will not get God's kingdom: people that sin sexually, people that worship idols, people that do the sin of adultery, men that let other men use them for sex or that have sex with other men...

1 Corinthians 6:9-10, EVD

...God left them and let them do the shameful things they wanted to do. Women stopped having natural sex with men. They started having sex with other women. In the same way, men stopped having natural sex with women. The men began wanting each other all the time. Men did shameful things with other men. And in their bodies they received the punishment for those wrong things they did.

Romans 1:24-25, EVD

The last two passages are very plain that active homosexual relations are sinful and displease God. These passages even make it clear that those who practice such sins cannot enter God's kingdom.

It does not matter that homosexuals are kind to each other and practice "tender love". A man committing adultery with another man's wife can practice "tender love" toward this woman. That does not make his adultery right. In the same way homosexual sin cannot be made right.

God intended sex to be between a man and a woman who are married to each other. He did not intend sex to be twisted into an unnatural thing that happens between men.

Marriage should be honored by all people. And every marriage should be kept pure between only two people. God will judge guilty those people who do sexual sins and adultery.

Hebrews 13:4, EVD

Rev. V. Gene Robinson has proclaimed that he does not agree with those who believe the Scriptures preach against homosexuality. We regret his attitude, because we believe the Bible is very plain against homosexuality. God's thoughts are higher than man's thoughts, see Isaiah 55:8-9. So we cannot tell God, "I think homosexuality is right" because His thoughts revealed in the Bible show that homosexuality is wrong and a sin.

Rev. Robinson was married with children, but left his family for his male lover. And yet 1 Timothy 3:2 clearly says a bishop must be the husband of one wife. Verse 4 says the bishop must rule his house (family) well. Rev. Robinson does not meet these qualifications. It is a tragedy that the modern Episcopal Church apparently has no intention of following God's Word.

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
